Wright, bishop of East Carolina, the twelfth annual Episcopal College Student Conference convened in Raleigh on February 11, 12, 13, 1949. State College acted as host for the conference this year. "The Anglican Communion" was the main theme of the meeting, but other topics were brought up in the discussion groups held Saturday.
Dr. Nash gave three addresses on the subject of "The Anglican Communion: Past, Present, and Future." In the informal discussion groups which met Saturday the topics discussed were: "Why Have the Church?," "Denominational Differences," "Opportunity of Lent," "Lay and Professional Vocations of the Church,"" "Holy Communion," and "Preparing for Christian Parenthood."

## Ohio College Offers Trustee Scholarships

Five Trustce scholarships of $\$ 1,000$ each will be available to young women entering Western College for Women at Oxford, Ohio, as Juniors in September, 1949. Each Scholarship amounts to $\$ 500$ a year for two years and will be awarded to women students of recognized Junior Colleges who will graduate in June, 1949, and who wish to enter Western College in September, 1949. Sophomores in four-year colleges are not eligible.
Sophomore girls at Saint Mary's Junior College have an opportunity to try for these scholarships which will be awarded on the basis of past scholastic achievement, character, health and general intellectual and social intcrest.
