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Artur Rubinstein Appears In Concert

World-Renowned Polish Pianist Makes 11th Tour of Country

Raleigh's Civic Music Association featured Artur Rubinstein in the second concert of the series February 25 at the Memorial Auditorium. $M_{\rm P}$. Rubinstein, Polish pianist, is Now on his eleventh consecutive tour of this country.

Mr. Rubinstein made his formal debut at the age of eleven in Berlin. By the time he was fifteen his reputation was established throughout Europe, and in 1906 he first visited the United States. Rubinstein has covered over two million miles of this world giving concerts and has appeared in every country except Tibet.

Rubinstein chose Beethoven's Sonata in F minor, Opus 57 (Appassionata) for the opening selection of als concert. The second selection as Carnaval, Opus 9, by Robert Schumann.

After a short intermission, Rubinem began the second portion of program with Prole de Bebe (The Baby's Family) by Heilor Villa-Lobos. He played three of the ^{1ght} pieces in this suite. The third and fourth selections were Debussy's La Plus Que Lente and L'isle joy-

Rubinstein concluded the concert with three numbers by Frederic Chopin. They were the following: Rallade in A flat, Opus 47, Waltz in (sharp minor, Opus 64, and Polo-naise in A flat, Opus 53. The public recentled Mr. Rubin-The audience recalled Mr. Rubin-

Rabbi Kaplan Speaks For Brotherhood Week

Rabbi Kaplan of the Temple Beth Or in Raleigh spoke to the Saint Mary's student body assembled in the auditorium on March 1. The theme of Rabbi Kaplan's talk was "Brotherhood and How It Can Be Obtained." The Reverend I. Hard-ing Hughes introduced Rabbi Kaplan who has lived in many parts of the country and came to Raleigh last fall from Albany, Georgia.

Rabbi Kaplan stated that we can obtain brotherhood primarily through knowledge of each other. He believes that most prejudices and wars come from ignorance, and if men knew the truth of religion, they would realize the close bond which connects different religions. He pictured biblical characters of different faiths as being in the audience and said that it was impossible to believe that they would not fraternize with each other.

The one goal which he is trying to achieve is that of raising people to the noble heights of one religion. To illustrate his point he told a Hebrew legend. The gate keeper in Heaven would not admit the Protestant, Catholic, or Jew because, in asking for permission to enter Heaven, they had never spoken in terms of a universal Father. When they began to read the Bible together conceiving its true meaning, he let them enter.

The Rabbi declared that "In the eyes of God we are all his children and everyone is alike. We should all learn this lesson because the future and destiny of mankind de-pend upon it." The Rabbi concluded his talk by asking, "Have we not one Father and has not one God created us all?"

Famous Orchestra

Leonard Bernstein Conducts Pittsburgh Symphony Concert

The Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra with Leonard Bernstein as guest conductor and piano soloist presented the third in a series of concerts of the Raleigh Civic Music Association February 29 at Memorial Auditorium.

The Pittsburgh Symphony was founded in 1927. It's growth came in 1938-1948 when it was under the direction of Fritz Reiner. In 1947 the Pittsburgh Symphony went, as the first major American Symphony orchestra, to Mexico City for a series of concerts. Since Reiner's resigning, the orchestra has adopted a guest conductor policy.

Peter Llyitch Tschaikowsky's Symphony No. 6 in B minor, Op. 74 ("Patheique") was the first selection of the concert: The orchestra played the four movements of this symphony.

After intermission, the program resumed with Concerto for Piano and Orchestra in G Major by Maurice Ravel. Mr. Bernstein played the piano for this arrangement. A small portion of the orchestra accompanied him. The concluding selection was Gershwin's An American In Paris. Gershwin wrote this music when he was in Europe. He did not want it interpreted in the French style but wished it to show the impressions of an American in the French capital.

Mr. Bernstein and the orchestra rendered three encores. They were two Strauss waltzes and another work of Maurice Ravel.

Donald Peery Reviews Rubinstein's Concert

Donald Peery, member of the Saint Mary's music department, presented the assembly program on Thursday morning, February 24 in the auditorium. Mr. Peery stated that the week of February 22-28 could easily be called piano week at Saint Mary's because Dame Myra Hess, Artur Rubenstein, and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra with Leonard Bernstein conducting were all heard by the Saint Mary's student body within that one week.

Mr. Peery gave a resumé of the Pittsburgh Symphony program and he theme from Tschalkowlayed t sky's Sixth Symphony. He then devoted the remainder of his time to a discussion of Artur Rubinstein and a review of the music which he played in the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium Friday night, February 25.

He gave special recognition to Beetoven's Appassionata, by Schumann from which he performed a few numbers, the Ballade in A flat. (Continued on P. 4, Col. 3)
