

## Mr. Wingfield Returns To SMS To Give Second Interesting Assembly Program

### Russian Situation Aired by Raleigh Speaker

Alvin Wingfield, official of the Royal Typewriter Company, spoke in assembly on October 20. Mr. Wingfield, who spoke last year at Saint Mary's, returned at the request of the student body to discuss the Russian situation.

He began his talk by showing several elementary textbooks and an issue of the official Soviet newspaper, *Pravda*.

The consequences of Russia's possessing the atomic bomb was discussed by Mr. Wingfield. He compared poisonous gas with the atomic bomb; Mr. Wingfield stated that the atomic bomb was unlike gas because the atomic bomb could be used to wipe out an industrial area and thus disable a country, whereas gas would injure only a few soldiers. The country which uses the bomb first will therefore paralyze the other nation's industrial centers and facilities for rearmament.

The possibility of a break-up in the Bolshevik Party upon the death of Stalin was pointed out by Mr. Wingfield. With the Russians fighting among themselves, the threat of a World War would be diverted for a short time.

Mr. Wingfield said that he did not think that war was inevitable, for if he did, he would not waste his efforts in trying to educate Americans about Russia.
