Mrs. Jane Guess, popular head of the Physical Education Department, has completed her last year of service at Saint Mary's. Both faculty and students will miss her quiet, efficient manner, as well as her untiring co-operation.

Mrs. Guess came to Saint Mary's as Jane Cross in the fall of 1938. She filled the position of assistant in the Physical Education Department and teacher of dance. In her first year she began to make May Day a very special event. She gave it a quality which it had heretofore lacked. Literary societies chose the theme and planned the general aspects of May Day, while the Art Department selected costumes. Some of the music was composed by the Music Department, and the dances were created by the Dance Department under Mrs. Guess' direction.

Later as literary societies were discontinued and the war made costume material scarce, Mrs. Guess showed ingenuity in working out pageants for which old costumes could be used.

In the summer of 1941, Miss Cross married Mr. William C. Guess. In 1942, under Mrs. Guess' inspiration, Orchestis was organized and modern dance assumed its important place at Saint Mary's.

Mrs. Guess became head of the department with the departure of the former head in 1943. She showed that her abilities were administrative as well as artistic. In addition to her other activities, she has helped Miss Davis with movements in plays.
