Bishop Noland Gives Baccalaureate Sermon

The Right Reverend Iverson Batchelor Noland, Suffragan Bishop of Louisiana, will deliver the Baccalaureate Sermon in the Chapel Sunday, May 31, at 11:00 a.m.

Bishop Noland was born September 10, 1916, in Baton Rogue, Louisiana. He attended University High School in Baton Rogue and Louisiana State University, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1937. Then he attended the School of Theology at the University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee, and graduated in 1940 with a degree of Bachelor of Divinity. He was ordained Deacon in November, 1939, and ordained Priest in 1940.

During World War II Bishop Noland served as Chaplain in the U. S. Army. In 1946 he became Rector of the Church of the Holy Comforter, Charlotte, North Carolina. In 1950 he became Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Lake Charles, Louisiana, from which parish he was elected Suffragan Bishop.

In 1936 he married Miss Nell Burden of Baton Rouge. Bishop and Noland have three sons son Batchelor, Jr., John Burden, and Daniel Woodring.
