Dr. Richard G. Stone Speaks To Student Body In Assembly

Honorary School Organization Inducts Three New Members

President Explains **Board Activities**

Dr. Richard G. Stone spoke to the student body in assembly Tues-day, November 10, on the activity of the Board of Trustees. He explained the purpose of his report and gave reports of the various ac-tivities of the Board.

The Development Fund, he explained, was to solicit money from groups interested in Saint Mary's to be used for new classrooms and a new science building. The project of building Cheshire Hall was aided by the Development Fund, the Episcopal Church, business firms of Raleigh, and the alumnae.

The second use of the money is to add to the general Endowment Fund. This money, which may not be spent, is used for the protection of the school. The Fund has increased from \$174,000.00 in 1946 to \$286,000.00 in 1953. The income of the Endowment Fund is used for general purposes. The new income from pledges will raise the Endowment income to \$11,000.00 a year.

A new organ will be installed in the chapel in the near future. \$15,800.00 is being spent for this purpose. \$475.00, of which \$300.00 was given by the sophomore class of 1953, is to be spent for additional pipes in the chapel. The income is ^{also} used for scholarships and for ^{supplies} for designated departments.

Dr. Stone told the students that Saint Mary's is a member of three erganizations. The organization of the North Carolina Foundation of Church Related Colleges is made up of twenty-four of the twenty-nine church related colleges in the state. this organization obtains funds from business corporations to be used for operating the schools' budgets.

The general charge for Saint Mary's has been increased to \$1,-75.00. This amount divided by thirty-four weeks of school would be 5 00 a day for room, board, laun-"ry, teachers, and medical attention.

Dr. Stone also suggested to the Board to have Saint Mary's name changed from Saint Mary's School and Junior College to Saint Mary's Trustees granted this request beause the new name gives a better aplanation of the school's program.

He believes that "a nose for news," that is "the ability to see an interesting fact or summarize an interesting situation, then record it," is one of the major requirements of a good reporter. Other requirements are "accuracy and a constructive attitude toward the profession." He mentioned various women who had worked for the News and Observer as examples of what women could do in the field of journalism. He ended his speech by inviting the girls to visit the "Old Reliable."
