Former President Passes Suddenly

ate time.] The president of St. Mary's Junior College from 1932 to 1945, Mrs. Margaret Jones Cruikshank, died suddenly after a heart attack in Fayetteville on December 26, 1955.

Funeral services were conducted by the Right Rev. Edwin A. Penick at St. Mary's Chapel. She was buried in Oakwood.

Mrs. Cruikshank was born October 13, 1878, in Hillsboro. She was a member of the 1893 gradu-ating class of St. Mary's School and was valedictorian of her class. She studied at UNC for one year and then attended Columbia University where she received a B.S. Degree in Mathematics. In 1937 she was awarded an M.A. Degree in History from Duke University.

She taught mathematics at St. Mary's from 1897 until 1910 except for the years she was studying at Columbia University and UNC. Mrs. Cruikshank became president of St. Mary's after the death of her husband and remained in that position until 1945 when she retired.
