The combined efforts of the Dramatic and Music departments will present on Saturday, June 2, at 8:30 P. M., An Evening of Opera by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. This program is in commemoration of the two-hundredth anniversary of this famous composer's birth. The entire program will be directed by Miss Geraldine Cate and Miss Florence Davis. The accompanist will be Mrs. Virginia Phelps Clan-
First on the program will be Bastien and Bastienna, a comic opera in one act. This opera, translated from German by Olga Paul, is a typical cighteenth century play written for garden performances. Bastien and Bastienna was written when liozart was only twelve years old, and was first produced in Vienna in 1768. The characters are: Bastienna, a shepherdess, Carolyn Myers; Bastien, her sweetheart, Patsy Amn Moore; and Colas, a socalled magician.
