Florelle Gwaltney dealt with lying. She stated that we damage not only ourselves through practice of such deceit but also hurt those around us. One should realize that truth reigns in the end, and nothing is gained by lying. In Shirley Smith's talk on cheating, she stated that no matter how much we stand to gain materially through cheating, we are really ruining our character if we yield to the temptation.

Dottie Pierson spoke on stealing. This offense is also one which underminds one's character and should be curbed before it becomes a habit. Dottie pointed out that by stealing one violates both the Honor Code and the Ten Commandments.

Coleman Jenkins discussed drinking. She stated that although some communities do not disapprove of

She stated the importance of the school's knowing where students are in case of an emergency. This is a matter of protection of the school's reputation as well as ours.

Next, Louise Jones dealt with the library offenses. She reminded the students that either taking a book out of the library without signing for it or mutilating any library property is inconsiderate to other students.

Dickie Robinson discussed unlady-like conduct. She said that all of us should act properly in order not to reflect seriously on our own or the school's reputation.

In conclusion, Barry Bowen read the Honor Code to remind us of our earlier pledge to abide by it. The program closed with the entire student body singing the school hymn.
