The Circle of Faith by Marcus Bach is a nonfiction book in which the author went on a trip to explore a variety of religious experiences. He interviews several well-known people, among which are Helen Keller, Pope Pius XII, and Albert Schweitzer. He was searching to find what people so different could have in common. The answer to this question is in the book which also contains the stories of each of these different personalities.

Another new and interesting book which the library has recently acquired is My Family and Other Animals by Gerald Durrell. This captivating volume is the author's account of five years spent with his family on the island of Corfu.
