

Mock UN Assembly To Be Held

Recent excitement in the United Nations makes the coming mock U. N. assembly to be held at Duke University of particular interest to St. Mary's students and to other college students of this area. On February 23, 24, and 25, delegations of five members each from surrounding colleges and universi-ties will assemble at Duke to take part in reconstructing a typical United Nations meeting.

Each delegate will represent a U. N. member nation. Exactly which nation the St. Mary's girls will represent is unknown at present, but the hope is that it will be one of the smaller ones which would wield great influence, such as Ghana, Cuba, or a Middle East country.

There is hope among the dele-gates that Dag Hammerskjqld, Secretary General of the United Nations will pay a visit to the as-sembly at Duke.

Issues and U. N. policies will be debated in committees and on the floor of the mock general assembly. College students will have the opportunity to voice their opinions on such great unsettled problems as the Cold War and disarmament.

Delegates from St. Mary's are all students of Miss Mor-rison and Mrs. Martha Stoops. Extensive study and preparation are ahead for the delegates in order that they may prepare themselves for handling the intensive work of the U. N.
