## In Progress

With the coming of the Lenten Season, changes mark the religious activity at St. Mary's.
On the seventeenth of February, Rev. I. Harding Hughes, chaplin at St. Mary's from 1942 to 1957, addressed the students during the morning chapel service.
In the Lenten Scason, students will have the opportunity to hear other visiting ministers. Usually each Friday a guest minister will conduct the chapel program. Bishop Murray of Alabama will speak at one of these services
On Sunday, February 26, the Rev. B. Daniel Sapp, rector of Christ Church in Raleigh, will conduct the eleven o'clock service. On March 12, the Rev. G. S. Wertz of Garner, will be here to bring the morning message.
Apart from the regularly scheduled chapel programs, special services will continue through-out the Lenten season. Dr. Guerry suggests that each girl may wish to clip the following schedule for future reference.
Monday: 9:30-10:00 p.m. Candles will be lit on the altar to aid in silent devotion. Tuesday: From 6:30-7:30 p.m. the Chaplain will have an instruction or discussion at his home for those interested in confirmation or the Episcopal Church. Silent devotion conducted between $9: 30-10: 00$ p.m.
Wednesday: Immediately after supper, a candlelight service with organ and prayer meditation lasting for ten to fifteen minutes Thursday: At 6:55 a.m. Holy Communion will be administered. The night service will follow Monday's night schedule. Friday: Monday's schedule will be followed

## ELECTIVE COURSE: SHAKESPEARE

Restricted to seniors, English $2 \overline{5}$ and 26 are elective courses in which hle student studies all the major Blays of Shakespeare. The first sennester's work consists of a reading of twelve comedies; the second semester a reading of three chronicle plays and nine tragedies. A student may choose either the first or second course or both courses. The primary purpose of the courses is to provide as full an understanding of the plays as possible. Because the plays were written for a specific audience at a Splecific time, the approach to the plays is historical. ## Process Of Legislation

At St. Mary's students have the privilege of being able to request various changes in the regulations to afford them a happier and more beneficial college life. The legislative body of the Student Government under the chairmanship of Suzanne Bowles evaluates each petition and either rejects it or accepts it. If accepted the request is considered by Dr. Stone for the final approval or rejection.

Many girls have taken advantage of this opportunity this year. At the most recent meeting Feb. 1961, members of the senior class petitioned to obtain two additional Saturday nights and also to be allowed one cut per class, not including week-ends. Both petitions were rejected. However, the underclassmen were granted the privilege to double date without an upperclassman. Each of these petitions plus the majority of previous ones indicated a greater interest in trying to leave school more frequently than in trying to improve the conditions on campus. Mr. Tate, advisor to the legislative body suggested at an earlier meeting that an effort be made to stimulate interest in making St. Mary's campus life more pleasurable. Several girls have adhered to this proposal and have requested that an ironing board be placed in Smedes to relieve students on that hall from having to go to another hall to iron their clothes. The legislative body is considering this petition now.

The work of this representative group is probably the most farreaching of any branch of the Student Government, for it is through the legislative body members that students obtain what they believe to be adrantageous to them.

## Elections Soon

Most of our time in assembly for the next two weeks will be taken up with student elections. The nominating committee will present its nominations, nominations will be made from the floor, and the election by the student body will take place soon afterwards. On February 28, we will have nominations for president of the Student Government Association and Rabbi Ben Asher to speak to us. On March 2, there will be nominations for chairman of Hall Council, on March 7 there will be nominations for the vice-president of the Student Government Association, and on March 9 there will be nominations for the secretary of Hall Council.
