Miss Virgilia Peterson, wellknown lecturer, author, and book critic, spoke at St. Mary's on Thursday, December 7. Miss Peterson a pative of New

Miss Peterson, a native of New York, was educated at the Westover School in Connecticutt, at Vassar College, and at the University of Grenoble in southern France. While she was in France, she met Prince Paul Sapieha of Poland, whom she later married. She was living in Austrian Poland during the early days of World War II.

Miss Peterson is well-known to literary audiences as moderator of the TV program "The Author Meets the Critic," through her radio program "Books in Profile," and through her regular reviews in the New York Herald's Tribune's "Books." Miss Peterson herself has written two books, one a best-seller called Polish Profile, and a very recent autobiography, A Matter of Life And Death

Life And Death. The books that Miss Peterson commented upon were McCullers' Clock Without Hands, O'Connor's Edge Of Sadness, Salinger's Franny And Zooey, Steinbeck's The Winter Of Our Discontent, Bedford's The Faces Of Justice, Gary's Promise At Dawn, Lewis' The Children Of Sanchez, Schorer's Sinclair Lewis, and Teilhard de Chardin's Phenomenon Of Man. All except The Faces Of Justice, The Children Of Sanchez, and Phenomenon Of Man were on the Best Seller List for the week of December 3.

### Students Will Have Opportunity To See Famous Operetta

An unusual opportunity awaits all St. Mary's students on Decem-ber 15! For the first time in many years because of exceptional vocal talent Amahl and the Night Visi-tors will be performed on the St. Mary's stage. This well known operetta, written and composed by the contemporary artist Giam-Carlo Menotti, is annually seen on the professional stage, but is seldom staged live for a collegiate audience. The poignant story has its setting at the time of the birth of Christ. Amahl, a crippled boy, and his mother live in the depths of despair and poverty and seldom know from where their next meal will come. The climax of the story is a miraculous visit by the three kings, who are on their way to Bethlehem to see the Christ Child. The outstanding consequences of this visit leave the audience filled with empathy with the stage actors.

Portraying Amahl is Gretchen Bode, a senior at Cathedral High and also a special voice student at St. Mary's. Nanne Chalgren, whose outstanding vocal talent is well known on our campus, plays the roll of Amahl's mother. The three kings, Melchoir, Balthagar, and Kasper are portrayed by Dr. James Edwards, William Stephenson, and Bill Allen. These men are well known in Raleigh for their exceptional voices. The twenty shepherds who add a touch of humor and animation to the play are students who attend St. Mary's and N. C. State. Among these timid shepherds are Sharon Finch, Martha Wright, and Dick Mitchell, who overcome their shyness and perform dances which are, indeed, fit for kings. Karen vom Lehm, the stage manager, and Georgia Roux, chairman of the set committee, add to the realism of the play through their many qualified services.

Under the excellent supervision of Mr. Charles Billings, the dramatic director and a former Carolina Playmaker; Miss Geraldine Cate, the musical director; Mrs. John Kovach, the choreographer; and Carolina Myers, *Amahl and* the Night Visitors will certainly be an operetta full of excellent drama, superb vocal talent, and unique dancing.
