Rev. Smythe To Preach At Baccalaureate

The Reverend Thomas J. C. Smythe will be the guest speaker at St. Mary's Baccalaureate Service on Sunday, May 31.

The Reverend Mr. Smythe, a graduate of Sewanee, the University of the South, is well known throughout North Carolina for his services as rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd at Rocky Mount. He has recently transferred to the Church of the Holy Trinity in Greensboro.

At the Baccalaureate Service the faculty and graduating classes will process into the chapel and be given special seats in the nave. Guests and parents will be seated in the rear, and the choir will march in as usual. The topic of the Reverend Mr. Smythe's sermon has not yet been announced.

Dr. Guerry has also asked the Reverend Mr. Smythe to assist with the 8:00 a.m. service on commencement Sunday during which graduating classes will receive their last communion at St. Mary's.

St. Mary's is proud to welcome Dr. Edwin A. Penick, Jr. to her campus as this year's Commencement Day Speaker. Dr. Penick is the son of the former bishop of this diocese, The Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, and is a professor of religion and chairman of the Religion Department at Randolph Macon Women's College in Lynchburg, Va.

Dr. Penick did his undergraduate work at the University of North Carolina where he was Phi Beta Kappa. He later received his BD and PhD at Yale University. Dr. Penick married Jane Clark Cheshire, a former St. Mary's student.

Events Concluding School Year
