## St. Mary's Grad At Hollins Studies Abroad

Miss Ann Dorsey Day, a 1964 graduate of St. Mary's High School is one of 50 Hollins College sophomores now en route to Europe for a year of study and travel as members

of the Hollins Abroad program.

Ann is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nere E. Day, Jr., of 1019 South Bay Shore Drive, Virginia Beach.

Hollins has conducted a foreign

study program for 11 years. This year's Hollins Abroad group sailed (Feb. 4) from New York City aboard the S.S. Queen Anna Maria. The ship will call at Tangier and the students will have a operday stop in students will have a one-day stop in Lisbon, Portugal, before arriving at LeHavre, France.

Paris is the headquarters of the ollins Abroad program. While Hollins Abroad program. While there, Ann will reside with a French family and will study at the Sortanian and will study at th bonne. The program is under the direction of a member of the Hollins faculty in Paris.

Ann will leave Paris this summer for a three-month educational tour of some dozen countries arranged through the Council on Student Travel (Paris). The tour is designed to give the students a survey of cultural history of Europe as well as an insight into some of its current problems.

The students will resume their classes at the Sorbonne in the fall. They will return to the Hollins campus for the start of the second se-mester in February, 1967, as members of the junior class.
