Christmas Concert Set For December 15

The St. Mary's Glee Club and Ensemble will give a concert of Christmas songs in the auditorium on December 15, the night before vacation begins. There will be three parts in the program. One will be light or folk-type carols which will include: "Do You Hear What I Hear," "Willie Take Your Drum," a Burgundian carol, and "Song of the Seven Lambs." Two Spanish carols, "A La Nana" and "Villancico," will be performed: the latter will be sung completely in Spanish. Two English songs, "Good King Wenceslas" and "Masters in This Hall," and "Mary Had a Baby," an American Negro carol, will be sung. The Ensemble, with a group of men's voices, will sing Bach's "Unto Us a Child Is Born." This piece

will be sung in an English translation of the original German. The third part of the program will be "Exsultavit," and three repeat selections from the "Ceremony of Carols" by Britton. After the presentation they remained to question the actors. Faculty Members and Students Present Comic Opera in Assembly

Four illustrious opera singers of whom the Met knows nothing sang a comic opera, "The Grasshopper and the Turkey Gobbler," for St. Mary's assembly program on Thursday, November 9. The cast consisted of two members of the Junior Class and two distinguished members of the faculty. Anne Cooper, known in operatic circles as Livanja Cadman, and Anne Sykes, famous as Rosanna Scarlotti, ably interpreted the female roles melodiously accompanied by Mr. Bulley as Giovanni Kichner, and Mr. Roberts as Leonard Strebor. The opera that they performed was a delightfully comic piece that told the story of a gay and gallant grasshopper who was rudely eaten by a villainous turkey gobbler while the insect reposed on a sweet potato vine. The young grasshopper was mourned by all his greedy relatives in a tone "suggesting divvy" and by Miss Sykes, the lovely grasshopperess to whom he was betrothed. Miss Sykes also rendered the eulogy delivered by the Reverend Bumblebee. Miss Cooper sang the part of the maiden aunt with a distinct nasal twang, and Mr. Bulley portrayed the breathless herald who announced the death to a group of characters "only assembled on the stage of the Italian opera for choral purposes". The infamous Mr. Roberts was well cast as the villainous turkey; he was also the narrator. The entire cast wept copiously. Miss Cate lent tuneful accompaniment to the group while Laura Walters masterfully turned pages for her.
