## DR. STONE TO RETIRE IN 1969

Dr. Richard G. Stone, president of St. Mary's Junior College announced Sunday, February 18 that he will retire at the end of the 1968-69 school year.

Dr. Stone, head of St. Mary's since 1946, said he has informed the Board of Trustees and the faculty of his retirement plans. He will be 65 next October.

"The past 22 years have been busy and productive ones here at St. Mary's, and a deep satisfaction for me," Dr. Stone said. "I am announcing my decision to retire at this time so that the selection of a successor may be conducted in an orderly and expeditious manner."

The Rev. Thomas J. C. Smyth of Greensboro, chairman of the trustees, praised Dr. Stone for dedicated leadership to the school. "The high esteem in which St. Mary's is held, both in the academic community and in the

Dr. Stone, a native of Baltimore, Md., received his undergraduate degree at Western Maryland College, and earned his Ph.D. in economics at The John Hopkins University. He was awarded an honorary L.H.D. degree by his alma mater, Western Maryland College. His teaching career began at Wofford College. For ten years he was on the faculty of Converse College, as professor of economics and chairman of the economics department.

During World War II, he served in the U. S. Army in the Intelligence Division and was discharged with the rank of major. He was the chief of the Personnel Security Branch for the Third Army in Atlanta, and was awarded the Army Commendation Ribbon.

As president of St. Mary's, Dr. Stone has been active in educational and church affairs. He is past president of the North Carolina Association of Colleges and Universities, and serves on the College Commission of the Southern Association of Colleges and Universities.

He is a member and serves on the vestry of Good Shepherd Episcopal Church. On four occasions he has represented his diocese at the General Convention, the highest parliamentary body of the Episcopal Church. From 1958 to 1964, he was a member of the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church.

Dr. Stone is active in Raleigh civic and cultural affairs. He is past president of the Raleigh Rotary Club. Dr. and Mrs. Stone have one son, Richard G., Jr., currently engaged in graduate work at the University of Tennessee.
