## DR. STANLEY LECTURED ON NOVEMBER 3RD

On November 3rd, Dr. Clifford L. Stanley gave a lecture on "Ignoring Our Intellectual Ancestors." This lecture stemmed from a course Dr. Stanley taught and presented an interesting aspect of theology. His personal thesis about the past was: "Bear the past in mind and study it or else it will continue to haunt you." He ended his talk by stating that all periods of time have their peculiar problems. One of our characteristics is to ignore the problems which faced our intellectual ancestors.

Dr. Stanley was born in Williamsport, Pa. and attended the public schools there. He attended Bucknell University and graduated from the University of Virginia. A year later he received his M.A. in Philosophy from U. Va. At Union Theological Seminary in New York, Dr. Stanley received his Ph.D. in 1938.

After serving as a minister to churches in Pennsylvania and Missouri, Dr. Stanley joined Virginia

Seminary in 1946 as a professor of Systematic Theology where he is currently teaching. Dr. Stanley has written several chapters in various symposia and given many lectures in the field of theology.

## MR. PISANI'S INAUGURATION SCHEDULED NOVEMBER 14

Friday, November 14, 1969, marks the beginning of a new chapter of history for St. Mary's. The long awaited inauguration of the Reverend Frank Warren Pisani as President will take place.

The activities will begin with a celebration of the Holy Communion at ten a.m. in the school chapel. This service is for anyone who would like to attend.

At eleven, luncheon will be served outside. Among the 800 people expected to be present are all faculty and St. Mary's girls, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Visitors, representatives of past heads of the school, the Alumnae Council, and past alumnae presidents. The Cold Cuts will perform.

Friday afternoon, the inauguration ceremonies will begin at two o'clock in the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium. Included in the program will be clergymen from Ra-

leigh, the Bishops of North and South Carolina, Upper South Carolina, the Bishop-Elect of Virginia, and the Mayor of Raleigh. The Inaugural Address will be given by the President of Furman University, Gordon Blackwell. Dr. Richard Stone, President Emeritus, will present the keys of the school to Mr. Pisani.

Delivering greetings for the Student Body will be Miss Katherine Harrison, and for the faculty, Dr. Mabel M. Morrison. Greetings for other groups attending the ceremonies will be given.

## CHANGES MADE IN CHAPEL SCHEDULE

On October 16th the Chapel Committee met and proposed the following resolution concerning worship service at St. Mary's: Monday at 10:30 chapel will be held for seniors and sophomores; Wednesday at 6:30 Evening Song will be held for all students (Day students are invited); Friday at 10:30 chapel will be held for juniors and freshmen; and Sundays, students may attend either Holy Communion or the 11:00 Church Service.

In adopting this resolution, the Chapel Committee has kept a number of purposes in mind: (1) to preserve the beauty of an evening worship service, (2) to create an atmosphere of spiritual unification through worship in the middle of the week, (3) to give students of different denominations an opportunity to attend other Raleigh churches after they have participated in either the 8:00 or the 11:00 service on campus. This resolution went into effect October 27th on a trial basis of one semester.

Several students at St. Mary's were asked their reactions to the change in the chapel policy. Mary Strange said, "It is a step forward to a better attitude towards chapel because it is too much to require someone to go to chapel twice on Sunday." Laura Beckman commented, "It gives me an extra hour to study on Sundays." Linda Glass added, "I will miss the Sunday night program. I do not think Sunday night chapel should be mandatory because it is inconvenient for people taking weekends. I also do not think the Wednesday night program will have the same atmosphere as the Sunday evening service." Sally Dillard said, "I can see why some people would like it, but I enjoyed ending my Sundays with the evening chapel program."
