CURRENT TRIVIA ...

How will the earth end? Long before the sun cools off, it will go through periods of intense heating which will turn the earth into a cinder, according to Dr. Isaac Asimov of the Boston University School of Medicine, reporting in the November issue of SCI-ENCE DIGEST. Many scientists have long thought the end would come when the sun burned itself out, freezing the earth and everything on it. But don't get upset, says Dr. Asimov. It won't happen for about eight billion years.

Malaria, the disease scientists thought was beaten, is making a comeback in the United States, says the November SCIENCE DIGEST. DDT was believed to kill the anopheles mosquito, carrier of the disease, but experts are finding the bug immune to the spray. Dr. Herbert S. Heineman, Director of the Division of Infectious Disease of the Division of Infectious Disease eases at Philadelphia's Hahnemann Medical College, reports this resistance, plus Vietnam veterans carrying the disease, increased travel abroad, and an expanding reservoir of latent infection are the factors causing a startling increase in the disease in the United States.

A million years ago, dinosaurs had a mercury pollution problem, reports the November SCIENCE DIGEST. Tests conducted t ed by the New York State Department of Environment New York State Department of Environmental Conservation on the neck bone of a mastodon showed it contained one part per million of mercury - twice as much as federal standards allow in food for human consumption. The tests are part of a probe for mercury problems in wildlife.
