Just lay my bones in study hall


Tell my teacher I did my best Then pile my books upon my

TSS: WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

the Warnings on television, warnings interrupting radio broadcast, warnings posted in all the drug stores, newspapers, and magazines. The warnings all concern a rare disease termed

Toxic Shock Syndrome (TSS).
Why all the sudden attention to TSS if it is an uncommon disease? The introduction of Rely tampons created the fervor. Although all tampons are suspected in contributing to the risk of contracting the disease, Rely tampons are thought to be responsible for seventy percent of all recent cases. Not only the Rely tampons, which have all been recalled, but all super plus tampons are believed to increase a

woman's chances of getting

sudden fever of generally over 101 degrees, vomiting or diarrhea, and other symptoms such as a sudden drop of blood pressure, dizziness, and a rash similar to sunburn could signify Toxic Shock Syndrome. According to the FDA, emergency medical attention might be needed should any of these symptoms occur, since the disease can be fatal. Advice offered by the FDA concerning prevention of the disease is as follows:

1. You can almost entirely avoid the low risk of getting TSS by not using tampons.

2. If you choose to use tampons, you can reduce your risk by using them on and off

during your period.
3. If a doctor has told you that you have had Toxic Shock Syndrome, or, if you believe you have had the disease, do not use tampons until you check with your doctor.

Research is being done at present to find out more about the disease and its connection with tampons.

When asked if they were taking measures in order to decrease the risk of TSS, several St. Mary's students replied that they were alternating tampons and napkins during menstruation while many others continue to appreciate the convenience of only tampon use.
