has been needed and demanded, for the old buildings and situation were not nearly adequate to meet the obligations; so the new site and buildings have been erected and must be financed. A great part of this \$1,500,000 to be raised is to meet the deep indebtedness of Meredith College, but the other institutions mentioned are to have a portion of the money. \$85,000 of the amount is apportioned to come to Mars Hill College. In short, the purpose of the campaign is to pay off the debts now on the Baptist Institutions of North Carolina and put them on a cash basis.

It will never do to let the state institutions educate all our young people; for they cannot supply the most essential phase of life, the spiritual need. Statistics prove that the greater number of the religious workers and spiritual powers receive their inspiration and information from denominational colleges. For instance, since 1857 Mars Hill has sent out over five hundred ministers of the gospel while other religious schools have made similar records. State institutions are essential; but the other institutions must be supported, too. Baptist schools develop their young people physically, socially, mentally, morally and spiritually, which are essential and important qualifications.

The eastern part of the state has been canvassed already, and inspiring reports have come from the work. The work is being carried on now in the Piedmont section of the state, and a number of speakers have gone out from Mars Hill. Those who have already spoken are Dr. R. L. Moore; Professors R. M. Lee, P. C. Stringfield, J. A. McLeod, A. N. Corpening; Messrs. Charles Roper and Charles Maddy; Misses Ruth Cooper, Bonnie Hildebrand, and Mary Harris. Dr. Moore has spoken at Maiden First Church, East Maiden, West Hickory Church, Lincolnton at a banquet, in Gaston County, High Point, and near Statesville; Professor Lee has been to Lincolnton, Hickory, and near Statesville; Prof. Stringfield went to Lincolnton Avenue, Goodsonville, and River View Churches, all of Lincolnton and near Statesville; Prof. McLeod at Lincoln Avenue, Lincolnton and near Hickory; Prof. and Mrs. Corpening have been to Newton, Goodsonville, and Lincolnton; Charles Roper spoke at Corinth Church, near Hickory; Charles Maddy at Lincolnton and Statesville; Ruth Cooper spoke at Maiden, and West Hickory churches; Bonnie Hildebrand at Penelope in Hickory; and Mary Harris has been at River View and Lincoln Avenue Churches in Lincolnton.

Many other Mars Hill students are expected to work for this worthy cause, and the campaign will continue until it has covered the entire state. Glowing reports have already come from the work, and it is hoped that still greater ones are yet to come.
