Asheville Track Team Defeats Lions

Bailey Takes 13½ Points to Lead Scoring; Purser Wins Mile.

Nas Bailey, Mars Hill ace held the high score honors of Mars Hill vs Asheville School Meet with a tally of 13½ points, having taken one first place, two thirds and two seconds. Other Mars Hill trackmen holding first place honors were Purser, who ran the mile in four minutes and 58.2 seconds, and Wagoner who led the discus hurlers with a distance of 110 ft. and 3 inches.

The Blue's team, Led by Captain Dave Marshall, scored a decisive victory, taking top honors in all but three events. Captain Marshall, himself a spectacular example, coming through in the 440 run to set a new record of 52 seconds flat, shattering the record lately set by his colleague, Shields of 52.2, Marshall crowding Shields to second place. Cooner, also of football fame, was slightly trailing for top honors, having scored a total of 12½ points with one first place at javelin throw and second place at the discus, 100 yd. dash and relay.

The Asheville cinder team showed good form, easily romping over the track, bars, and hurdles for an overwhelming victory. The Whelp aggregation put up a stiff fight, but they were unable to stop the over-powering advance of the Blues.
