Lions Lick Brevard On Cinder Paths

Hensley And Early Lead Dickersonmen To Easy 84-47 Victory

Grabbing ten first places while the invading Brevard team took only four, Mars Hill swept to victory, 84 to 47, in a dual track meet between the two schools here April 14.

Napier of Brevard topped the scorers with 18 points by winning first place in the 100-yard dash and broad jump and placing in the 220 low hurdles, high jump, javelin throw and shot put.

Mars Hill was paced by Hensley with 11 markers and J. Early with 10 points.
