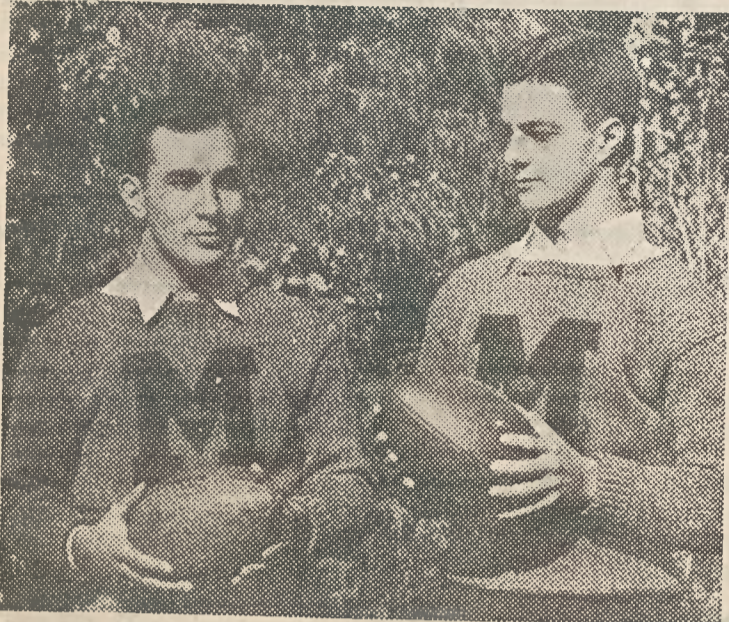

Ray And Whitaker Lead Lion's Attack In One-Sided Game Saturday Night

In a fast moving game the Mars Hill Lions cracked down on the Biltmore college cagers for a 29 to 18 victory here last Saturday night.

The Lions, led by Ray and Whitaker, jumped into a four-point advantage before the Bulldogs had scratched and maintained a margin throughout the rest of the game. At the half the Lions were in front 12-9; and once in the second half, the home boys shoved off into a commanding lead.

"Pop" Warner Held Two Coaching Posts At Same Time

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—(ACP)—Glenn S. "Pop" Warner, Temple University's 68-year-old grid mentor, is one man to whom failure brought success.

After graduation from Cornell, Warner hung out his law shingle in his home town, and cooled his heels on top of his desk for two months without a single case. When the chance to coach Iowa State College came along, he took it with the intention of continuing his law work later. The twenty-five dollar per week salary, in the words of "Pop," seemed like "big money."

When "Pop" did decide to coach he did it in a big way, too. After he had accepted the job at Iowa State, he received an offer from the University of Georgia, which he also accepted, being probably the only football coach to hold two coaching jobs in one season. He devoted the first month of the season to Iowa State and the remainder of the season to Georgia. Following the characteristic Warner style, both teams had successful seasons.

To date the Lions have not looked very impressive to your columnist. They are plenty fast and handle the ball well but they are going to face a serious handicap whenever they face tall teams like the one Seroco brought to town. The height of the "mail order" boys beat our team.

The season has barely begun however, and the boys will probably improve as the winter progresses.

Now we always did hate folks who say "I told you so," but let us say that we are glad we predicted a margin of "at least two touchdowns" for the Turkey day tilt.

We are inclined to agree with Coach Roberts when he says that the Lion margin would have been even greater had the game been played on a dry turf. Chick Murray and Bobby Edwards never had a chance to get away on any of the sweeping end runs that gained so much ground for the Lions on dry sod. The ball was too soggy for passing, yet Chick Murray completed two of three tosses for extra points.

The last bokay of the grid season goes to Bobby Edwards and his educated toe. Had the Lions been held scoreless in the final quarter, Bobby's toe would have been responsible for the victory. It was his beautiful, well-placed punts that backed the Tornado up against their own goal time after time and gave the Lions their first two scoring opportunities.

The final Williamson ratings, published last week, give us some interesting information.

Our Lions were rated as number 522 among the nation's grid machines for the year with a percentage of 40.5% perfect. Let us compare this to the rating of some of our season's opponents.

The Carson-Newman Eagles, victors over the Robertsmen by a 20-0 count, ranked as number 399 with 52.3%. Tusculum (tie, 6-6,) rated 553 with 37%. Hiwassee (Mars Hill, 6-0,) ranked 527 with 40.1%. Lees McRae (tie, 6-6) rated position 562 in the final count with 35.8%. Brevard (Mars Hill, 27-0) held number 564 in the standings with 35.6%. Wingate (Mars Hill, 6-0) is number 649 with 20.8% and W. C. T. C. (Mars Hill, 6-0) ranks as number 667 with 15.1% perfect.

It will be noted that the Lions ranked above every team in the North State Junior College conference, from whose ranks Mars Hill teams retired last spring. . . Yet, when the junior college all-star eleven was picked last week, only one Lion, Gianakos, was rated as good as the second team. Brevard, with a 27-0 licking at the hands of the Lions still fresh in their minds, placed three men on the first team.

Of course, we do not question the fairness of the judges! Duke,

the only major untied, undefeated and unscored upon eleven in the nation, placed no one on either the Associated Press or the Grantland Rice all-America teams. The reason: the scribes thought that the Blue Devils had too good a team collectively to possess any outstanding stars. Uh-huh, the Mountain Lions too! Maybe?

Ah well! Football is over until next year; let's drop the subject. To you tired readers (both of you), we promise a complete change of diet . . . Next time . . .
