The Raft, by Robert Trumbull, is an account of the adventure which thrilled Americans in 1942. We can remember the stories that newspapers carried telling of three Navy fliers who fought the sea for forty days while they drifted in a rubber raft without food, equipment, and proper clothing, yet survived to land, weak and bent, on a strange shore. The trio made a feeble effort to walk up the beach in military fashion. "If there are Japs on this island," said Dixon, "they'll not see an American sailor crawl. We'll stand, and march, and make them shoot us down, like men-o'-wars-men."

The story is more than that of hardship and courage; it is a testimony of personal morale, proof of the military value of the democratic ideal.

Robert Trumbull, the experienced newspaper man who stayed close to the fliers during their long convalescence, has written a whole book on the information he gathered from them. **The Raft** will stand among the enduring sagas of men and the sea.
