Banking on a strong defense and a smooth-clicking attack from a modified single-wing formation, Coach Ramsey's footballers should give a good account of themselves in their eight scheduled games.

Upheld by eight returning lettermen from former years, high school grid stars, and plenty of ex-GI material, the Mountain Lions are lying in wait for all who should dispute their right to the Southeastern Junior College Conference crown. Having taken that prize for three successive years before the war, and liquidating all Junior college material last season, the Lions are out for top honors in the 1946 race.

Thus far in the drills meted out in large quantity by Coach Ramsey, the Lions have concentrated on fundamentals, blocking, punting, tackling, and passing, along with several rough scrimmages among the four teams.

Minor injuries have kept a few of the first stringers on the sidelines during the intra-squad affairs; but, as a whole, the Lions are now far from their former greenness, and have shaped into one of the finest teams ever put out by Mars Hill College, or this part of the country.
