

President's chair and posed for our pictures. My picture turned out to be a double exposure. I did not mind that so much, but the Egyptian who was beside me did not like to see himself sitting in my lap in public.

I was surprised that the same things that interested me were interesting to the others of my age. I met one fellow named Abrahem from Iran who was very interesting. I tried to tell him that his name should be spelled Abraham, but he said he liked Abrahem better. He must have thought I was an odd character because he never let me out of his sight during the whole tour. He considered me very lucky to be a citizen of a country so magnificent as the United States. After I heard the troubles of his country, I thought so too. As one student said, "This is the only country in the world where you can win sixty-four dollars by naming the language that starts with the letter 'E' and is spoken in England."

The speakers really put some solid truths into our heads. It took a bit of hammering to get them there, but we finally got the ideas.

If any of us had the idealistic notion that the United Nations organization was the final solution to all our problems, we soon had it dispelled. As William Epstein, Senior Officer of the Department of Security Council Affairs, said, "The United Nations is not a government. It deals with governments. A decision of the General Ascembly is only a suggestion relying on the force of public opinion to carry the suggestion out. The attitudes of the smaller nations are but reflections of the attitudes of the Big Five. Only in the United Nations can the smaller nations have a chance to influence the world." We listened carefully and ignorantly, drinking in as much as we could. We had a lot of ideas blasted, but we came out feeling much more broad-minded and a lot closer to one another. We found that the problems and fears of all peoples of all nations are basically the same and that by

talking over our problems with one another we all profited.

When I left that evening I was not a citizen of North Carolina any more. I was a World Citizen.
