Seven Colleges To Participate In Conference

The Social Studies Conference, participated in by teachers of social studies, in the seven Baptist colleges in North Carolina, will meet on the Mars Hill campus October 15-16.

Registration will begin in Spilman parlor at two o'clock on Friday afternoon. The opening session will be held in the Philomathian hall at three o'clock, with C. C. Crittenden of the State Department of Archives and History delivering the keynote address.

After a supper in the Blue Room, at which Dr. Blackwell will officially welcome the visitors, the evening session will meet in Stroup Parlor. Miss Fannie Memory Farmer, Judge of the Domestic Relations Court of Cabarrus County, will speak on the subject "Legal Science and Social Science". A social hour will follow the meeting.

The Saturday morning program will include a breakfast in the faculty dining room, and the presentation of papers by Robert Elliott of Gardner-Webb and W. Buck Years of Wake Forest. The conference will be concluded with a business meeting.

Feezor To Speak At Fall Revival

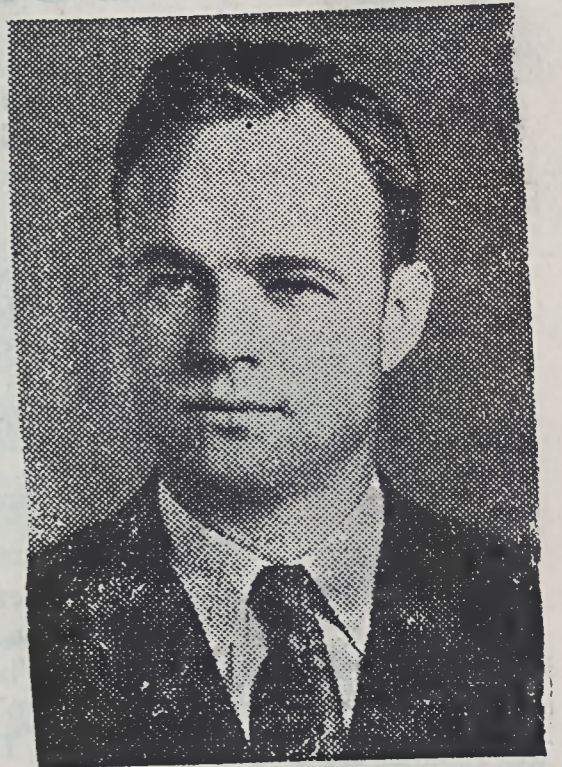
Dr. F. C. Feezor, the General Secretary of the Texas Baptist Convention, will hold the fall revival at Mars Hill Baptist Church November 7 through the 14, inclusive. Dr. Feezor was here last spring in Christian Focus Week on the campus.

Dr. Feezor attended Wake Forest College, and is a graduate of the Southern Seminary in Louisville. After finishing college he was called to the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Raleigh, N. C. He was later pastor of the Broadway Baptist Church in Fort Worth, Texas.

It is interesting to note that Dr. Feezor was Mr. Sodeman's pastor when he was a junior and intermediate in the Second Baptist Church in Liberty, Mo.

Dr. Feezor is to be one of the principal speakers at the N. C. Baptist State Convention the week following our revival.

An extensive visitation program is being planned in connection with the revival. There are also to be opportunities for counseling. The leaders and places for the counseling will be designated at a later date.
