Vice-president Erwin is a ministerial student from Baltimore, Maryland. He is president of the Maryland Club, a member of the ministerial conference and the BTU.



ars Hill College has grown from e small building on a four-acre act to nineteen buildings on one indred and thirty acres with seval additional buildings being anned for the near future.

Dr. Robert L. Holt, vice-presiint of the college, states in the w brochure, "Holding Fast to 'hat Which Is True," which tells the proposed plans for Mars [ill's future that "during the past ne hundred years trustees, alumni, nd other friends have joined earts and hands to build at Mars Iill a distinctive institution and o extend its services" and that the challenge now is to provide ven greater opportunities for

proposed, and they include an auditorium, gymnasium, two dormitories for women, one for men, an administration building, a maintenance building, and housing for the faculty members. This proposed building project is not new, but it is merely the continuation of a program started approximately fifteen years ago. Dr. Holt describes the building project as "one continuous, long-range program of which one cycle has been completed and another is now being begun.

In beginning this second cycle of building the administration is trying to provide even greater opportunities for the students who come to Mars Hill. This project is not being undertaken in hopes (Continued on Page Four)
