Co-Captain Larry Honeycutt, who may not have been as effective as possible against Ferrum because of a mouth injury sustained in practice last week, should be hale and hearty again, ready to add his 190 pounds to the scoring attack.
While the Lions and the Bobcats are battling in the first conference tilt of the season the other two teams in the league will be playing non-conference opponents. The Gardner-Webb Bulldogs will be entertaining the Furman freshman team and Wingate's Bulldogs will be host to the Chowan Braves, another Baptist junior college team from the eastern end of the state.
