

Fifteen workshops on various subjects and areas of BSU work will be conducted during the three-day conference. On hand to coordinate the entire conference will be the state director of BSU work, Dr. Bill Smith, and his associate, the Rev. Boyce Medlin.

New officers will be installed at the Saturday evening service which, as are all the sessions, are open to any college student.

The conference will end on Sunday with the delegates attending a Bible study on Christian vocation during the Sunday school hour, led by Dr. McCollough, and joining with the local congregation in the worship service at 11 a.m.

Nine Summer Meetings To Draw 2,000 Campus Visitors

scheduled during June, July and August are expected to attract more than 2,000 visitors to our campus.

Beginning with the Baptist Faculty Conference - a retreat for Baptists who teach in colleges throughout the nation on June 20-22, the meetings will be going on almost continuously through Aug. 16, when the annual conference of North Carolina school superintendents ends.

Summer school will be in session during all but the last conference.

The religious gatherings include an orientation program June 27 - July 5 for newly appointed Baptist foreign missionaries and candidates for appoint-

ment; a school of Christian study and fellowship July 8-12 for pastors and other church workers throughout the state; and an interracial retreat for Christian leaders on July 22-26.

The other five conferences involve public school personnel and students. They include a workshop for school maintenance supervisors on July 16-19, a congress of high school student council members July 21-26, a conference of classroom teachers Aug. 5-7, the North Carolina Education Association's Leadership conference Aug. 8-11 and the superintendents' conference Aug. 13-16.

Largest group will be about 600 attending the superintendents' meeting.
