# **Scotties Revenge Target In Finale**

The Mars Hill College Lions will get a second chance against the Maryville Scotties-a chance for revenge--when the Tennesseans visit our campus tonight for the final home game of the 1963-64 season.

Tonight's action will be a doubleheader. The freshmen Lions will play their first game of the year with Bluefield (Va.) Junior College. The peliminary game begins at 6:30 and the varsity tilt starts immediately afterwards.

After tonight only two more games remain on the varsity schedule and both will be played away. Next Thursday (Feb. 13) the Lions will tangle with the Emory & Henry Wasps and then on Saturday night (Feb. 15) they will close out the basketball season against Bryan University at Dayton, Tenn. These two games make up for cancelled games at the close of last year's season.

### **Majors Slate Three Talks**

"On the Job Teaching," a timely subject for students soon to embark on so-called "practice teaching" assignments, will be the title of three addresses to the Physical Education Majors Club in the Library Auditorium at 7:30 p. m. Monday.

Speakers will include Miss Lorraine Larson, women PE teacher at Lee Edwards High School in Asheville; Buck Lyda, a Mars Hill graduate who is PE teacher and coach at Enka High School; and Bobby McElrath, another MHC grad who is principal of Erwin High School near Asheville.

The possibility of sending a fund-raising letter in behalf of the proposed new gymnasium (see story elsewhere on this page) to the 13,000 former students on the college's mailing list will be discussed during the business session.

A report will also be heard on plans for Career Day on Apr. 18. Invitations have been mailed to physical education teachers and two interested students in each of 22 high schools in Madison and surrounding counties.

The Lions picked up their fifth win of the season last week when they played host to Kentucky Christian College. They pulled ahead early in the contest and held a six point lead at the half. Midway in the second half they lost the lead when the "Christians" went ahead by three points. In a few minutes, however, Mars Hill surged back into the lead and went on to win 115-97.

Last Saturday night (Feb. 1) Mars Hill lost its ninth game at Maryville 74-63. Maryville got off to a better start in the beginning of both halves when the Lions could not seem to hit the basket. They almost caught the Scotties at the end of the first half as the score was 33-31; however, early in the second half Maryville, with an extra strong team effort, pulled ahead for keeps to win their first game of the season.

The games with Kentucky Christian and Maryville were the first for the Lions following a 10-day lull because of exams and second semester registration. Inaction seems not to have affected team performance, but the squad did lose one player because of academic deficiency, sophomore guard Pat Sams of Mars Hill.


### Scout Scouts **College Coeds**

A new physical education and athletics building, a much-needed and long-dreamed-of addition to Mars Hill's facilities, moved a step nearer reality recently when the buildings and grounds committee of the board of trustees met on campus.

The idea will be submitted to a meeting of the executive committee of the trustees in April and, if approved there, will be voted on by the full board at its semi-annual business meeting during the commencement season late in May.

The dressing rooms and rest rooms of the new building will serve spectators and players at football games and track meets as well as the normal traffic in the building.
