# Cook Assumes Presidency

Duane Cook accepted the position of president of SGA left vacant by the resignation of Terry Kuykendall at a special call meeting of the senate on Thurs., Oct., 19. In his speech Cook explained his actions of the last few weeks (see speech in this issue of the Hilltop) from his particular standpoint.

Preceding the acceptance speech the senate was confronted with student demands to be heard on this issue but senate procedure did not allow it.

Frank Farrell, whose resignation was not accepted by the senate decided to resign anyway saying, "Duane Cook acted

unjustly in accepting the office of the president."

Kuykendall who also spoke at the meeting remarked, "I question whether or not there is a student government now", and in closing said, "You can sit here and pass all the legislation you want but that's all you will do."

George Peery, faculty advisor to the SGA, commented, "This whole episode was filled with mistakes: initial timing, the blastoff issue, but the greatest stragical error of the resignees was their failure to submit a bloc resignation."

## NWF Accepting Ph. D Fellowships

The National Wildlife Federation has announced that applications are now being accepted for its 1973-74 program of Ph.D. fellowships in environmental conservation.

The annual grants, up to \$4,000 each, are open to doctoral candidates accepted by the graduate school of an accredited college or university by September 1973, or prior recipients of doctorates. Undergraduates or masters candidates are ineligible.

The program is sponsored by the NWF, its state affiliates, and supporting individuals and organizations, including the Charles E. Culpeper Foundation, Inc., the National Shooting Sports Foundation, and the American Petroleum Institute. Over \$300,000 has been channeled to doctoral candidates since the NWF began the program in 1951.

Considered candidates must be conducting research or studies in ecosystem or natural resource management, fish and wildlife management, range management, education, marine resources, communication and public relations, public attitudes and opinions, environmental pollution control, outdoor recreation, forestry, economics of natural resource management, park management, petroleum related problems, or any related programs.

Applications must be received at NWF headquarters on or before December 31, 1972 and the awards will be announced in April 1973. For application blanks, write the Executive Vice President, National Wildlife Federation, 1412 16th St., N. W., Washington, D. C. 20036.

## Senate Revote On Resignations Denied

Discussion of resignations of Student Government President Terry Kuykendall, Vice-President Duane Cook and Chief Justice Frank Farrell played a major part in the Senate meeting Monday, Oct. 9.

President Kuykendall simply stated he wanted to resign. Vice-President Cook, looking at the events of the previous week, gave reasons why he resigned. He reviewed accomplishments made by the past week's activities. He saw that people showed interest in the rights of students, their role in the governance of Mars Hill College and the role of SGA. Students became involved, interested and concerned with their lives as students on campus. Cook feels that partly as a result of student protest, the Admissions and Academic Standards Committee voted to allow students on this committee. Also, the

faculty voted to continue with the Review Commission. Finally, lines of communication opened were phenomenal for the Mars Hill Campus.

Cook indicated that some of the mistakes made were: not informing Senate of their plans to resign, assuming that Senators and students were aware of the problems of lack of communication and consideration between administration/faculty/students. They did not vocalize some aspects of the situation. Letting President Bentley chair and dominate the meeting on Thursday, Oct. 5 was another mistake Cook cited. With these reasons and emphasizing his feeling that Senators had lost faith in him as a leader, Vice President Cook then gave his resignation to Senate. Next, Chief Justice Farrell pre-
