

Head Football Coach Gibson Selected

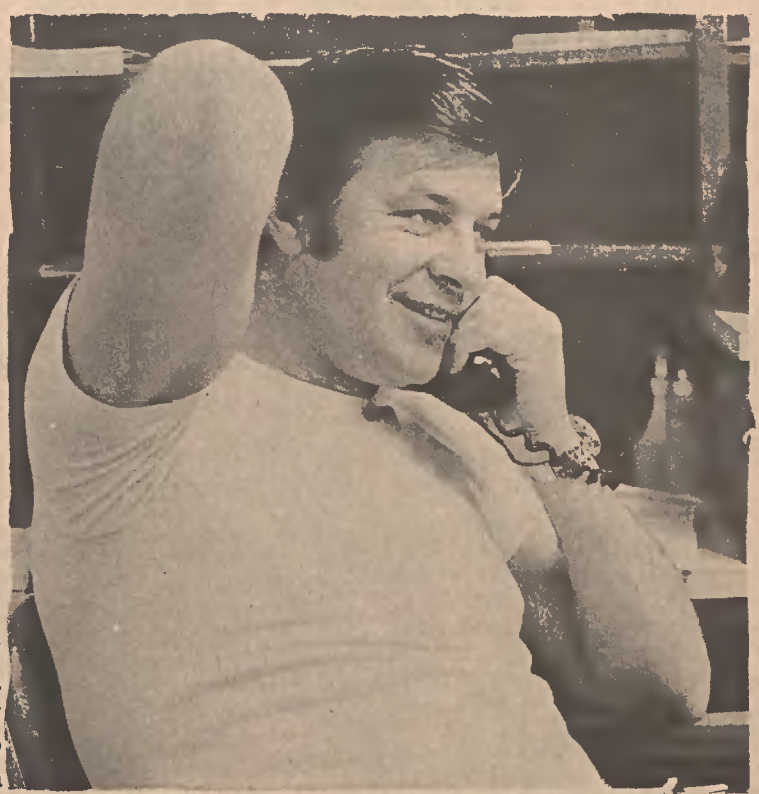
Mr. Claud Gibson has assumed the position of head football coach and athletic director for Mars Hill College.

Coach Gibson's football career began at Asheville High School where he lettered in football, basketball, and track three years. His senior year, 1957, he won the state championship in the high hurdles. He played football for N.C. State University and in his senior year, was an all-ACC defensive back and played in four all-star games.

In 1962, Gibson was drafted by the San Diego Chargers. His first season there, he was second in the AFL in interceptions. He played the 1963, 1964, and 1965 seasons with the Oakland Raiders. In 1967, he returned to

become coach of the defensive secondary at N.C. State University. That year N.C. State led the ACC in defense and compiled a 9-2 season record. In '68 he coached with the New England Patriots and then moved to the Buffalo Bills in 1969. In 1970 he became the head coach at Tulsa University, inheriting a team with a record for the previous season of 1-9. He then led them to a 6-4 season while earning the UPI Coach of the Week award. Coach Gibson is presently in the process of building a good staff, and motivating his players for next season. His training programs are already in progress and he has high prospects for the coming year even though he has very little knowledge of his competition.
