EDITORIAL NOTE: Since the conception of the college radio station in the fall of 1969, there has been considerable confusion concerning WMHC's purpose, management, and financing. During an interview with station manager Roy Gullick, the following information was obtained.

WMHC is basically financed by advertisements sold to businesses in surrounding communities and occasional S.G.A. equipment grants. A budget for the fall of 1972 was submitted to and passed by the Communications Board of the college, but was rejected by President Bentley. However, \$500 was allotted WMHC for the procurement of new equipment during the spring semester. The station manager also stated that a budget for the summer and fall semesters has been submitted and that all indications are that it will be passed.

The station owns three transmitters with only two in working order. Under these conditions all of the dormitories are reached except Treat, Spilman, the townhouses and the cottages. The third transmitter is missing two vital parts, but is hoped to be in place and operable in the near future. Even if all three transmitters were in working order, Gullick said that five additional transmitters were necessary to cover the college properly.

President, Duane Cook. The committee requests the suggestions and questions of the student body and any interested student may attend the open meetings.

Records owned by the radio station are obtained from record companies for promotional purposes. The size and location of the college often hinders the quantity and quality of records received, but contacts have been made with more of the major recording studios and the service from these companies has increased noticeably. Other records played on the air are the personal property of the DJ's.

WMHC's financial situation can be traced back to inadequate and outdated equipment, vandalism, theft, and an almost unbelievable number of station managers and advisors during its short lifetime.

The standards of the radio station are answerable to the Board of Student Communication Media, and also abide, but are not bound by the rules of the F.C.C.

WMHC's main purpose is to become an important factor in college life. Gullick stated that the typical function of a campus radio station, musically, is not only the playing of current hits, but also the testing of new material and groups by campus reaction.

Current programming includes both Progressive and Top 40 shows, a campus news program Tuesday and Thursday at 7:00 p.m., a talk show with prominent guests from the college and community, which will hopefully be expanded into a panel discussion.

One hundred and seventy Mars Hill students were named to the Dean's List for the fall semester of 1972.
