

English Opportunities

Students are urgently invited to help in archaeological excavations in England this summer. Deadline for applications is April 1.

City center redevelopment, new road-building programs and rapidly changing land use are threatening the disappearance of prehistoric graves, Iron-age settlements, Roman villas, fascinating relics of medieval towns, all over Britain.

American students free from mid-May, and with previous archaeological experience, are invited to join an international team on a dig of the important Anglo-Saxon site at Spong Hill where the 1973 excavation hopes to find new evidence of the early pagan settlements. Experienced helpers will receive free board for helping in this important work. Similar help is also required on work on a medieval manor near Chester.

Other students without experience are invited to join British Archaeology Seminar at Lincoln College, Oxford, organized by the Association for Cultural

Exchange. Six academic credits can be earned from participating in this low-cost program which ends by three weeks participation on digs in different parts of England and Scotland.

These include the Association's own mesolithic dig on the island of Oronsay in the Hebrides which last summer was visited by Queen Elizabeth,

ing the academic guidelines of the new program. The students will not only apply what they have learned in class but will learn even more on the job. Dr. Anderson commented that he "thinks a student learns more by supervised work outside of class."

The funding begins July 1, 1973 and continues till June 30, 1974. The new program offers a degree in sociology and is open to interested freshmen, sophomores, and juniors.

Need money? Worried about next semester's tuition? Now's your chance to rid yourself of some of those problems. Mr. David Mathews, Director of Financial Aid, announced that applications are being accepted for many scholarships for next year.

Among these are the Dean's scholarships. Fifty of these will be awarded ranging from \$200 to \$500. Other scholarships include the \$300 Taylor debating scholarship, the \$500 Brazil pre-medical scholarship (for a rising senior) and the \$750 Ella Pierce scholarship for an outstanding English major. Students interested in these scholarships should contact the related department chairman.

Several scholarships offered by Alumni chapters, mostly of \$500 are also available.

Mr. Mathews stated that federal aid to students was still in question since action was pending in Congress. However, he said that the college work study program would continue at the present level.

The weekend of March 15, 16, 17 is scholarship weekend for freshman and transfer students. During this weekend they will visit the campus for auditions and to be interviewed for possible scholarships.

Mr. Mathews stressed that those returning students applying for scholarships should do so as

soon as possible. Information can be obtained from Mr. Mathews in the administration building.

4-1-4 Studied
