The Mars Hill history department will host an oral history workshop on April 13 and 14. All member institutions of the Appalachian Consortium in western North Carolina have been invited to the two-day affair.

Dr. Evelyn Underwood, chairman of the

Mars Hill History Department, gave two purposes for the workshop. The first was to bring those people together who are already interested in oral history so that they can share and learn from one another. Secondly, to bring others in to try and arouse their interest in this teaching method.

Dr. Underwood further stated that oral history is just a technique of teaching that can be just as useful when applied in disciplines other than history.

Senior Service Offered

The Undergraduate Alumni Council of Mars Hill has announced a program called "goodwill service for seniors." According to Robert Ruark, president of the U.A.C., the program involves cooperation between graduating seniors and alumni.

Alumni in 28 geographic areas across the Southeast will act as contacts in their area. Ruark stated that the main purpose of the contacts will be to orient students to an area where they have recently moved. For example, the contact may be able to help the student find housing. Although the main objective is not to help students find jobs in an area, several contacts have offered to do so.

If someone is moving to an area that there isn't a contact, efforts will be made to have alumni in that area help

that person.
