The concern of this writer and many others does not lie with the faculty. In not one course during my endeavors at Mars Hill have I encountered a professor not willing to go the extra mile in an effort to cooperate with a student possessing some particle of initiative. The faculty is not of Harvard quality, nor is it expected to be. They do an admirable job and the question of their qualifications here is insignificant. What is significant is the attitude of the students and the merits awarded their accomplishments.

It takes no scholar to realize that a highly important segment of the student body cares very little about academic learning. Their reasons for college are obvious: to avoid the job market, find a spouse, play ball, or to simply have a good time. Their detriment to the other students in terms of time and energy from the faculty are revolting enough. Still, the disgust towards this trend culminates in the graduation ceremony. It is here that the student who has earnestly labored for four years receives a slip containing exactly the same inscription as the one owned by the student who slid through--content, regardless of ability, of attaining only grades that insure graduation.

The idea that these students will receive equal recognition defies all sense of logic, equity, and justice. To issue this recognition is a crime, not only to the deserving students, but to the image of Mars Hill College as well.

# OVERSEAS JOBS AVAILABLE

Any student applying soon can get a summer job in Europe for July, August and September. Jobs are available in the following countries listed in an order combining availability and number of jobs; time required to process permits and other papers; required qualifications; and social and other factors: 1) Austria, 2) Switzerland, 3) Germany and 4) France.

Paying jobs now open include all kinds of summer resort, hotel, tavern and restaurant work. Standard wages are paid, and room and board are provided free and arranged in advance. Volunteer work is also available in Germany, Spain and France but volunteer work offers only free room and board with no wages.

Work permits, health insurance, and a 5-day orientation period are provided in Europe to insure that you get off to your job at the right time with the right information and correct papers, after learning what to expect in Europe. All other instructions, information and details are exchanged by mail through the SOS Luxembourg Student Organization

while you are still at school or at home.

Students wishing a summer job in Europe may obtain an application form, job listings and descriptions, and a student handbook on earning your way in Europe, by sending their name, address, educational institution, and \$1 for addressing, postage and handling to Summer Placement officer, Student Overseas Services, 22 Ave. de la Liberte, Luxembourg-Europe.
