

MARS HILL - The cast for two French comedies, the final production of the 1973-74 season at Mars Hill College, has been announced by the play's director, C. Robert Jones, associate professor of speech and drama at the Baptist school.

The Apollo of Bellac, a oneact play by Jean Giraudoux, and The Doctor in Spite of Himself, reputed to be the loudest and funniest of Moliere's plays, will be presented in the college's Owen Theatre May 3 & 4, with repeat performances May 6 & 7.

Both of the plays are described by director Jones as "raucous comedy," and he is planning to use a simple set design characteristic of the 17th century commedia dell' arte. Many of the cast will do double duty, playing roles in both productions.

In the Moliere play, James W. Thomas, associate professor of speech and drama and acting department head, will play the lead of Sganarelle. He will also play the Chairman of the Board in The Apollo of Bellac.

the \$1500 UNDERGROUND was underway. Actually over 50 students had something to do with the building itself and thus many of these volunteers are proud to see the results of their labor.


