



## HALF A LIFETIME IN PRISON

William Geraway will speak on "Crime and Punishment in America" in Moore Auditorium on Tuesday, November 18 at 8:00 p.m. The lecture, as well as the movie "Sing Sing Thanksgiving" to be held in Belk Auditorium on Tuesday, November 11 at 8:00 p.m., are being co-sponsored by the Visiting Lecturers and Artists Committee and the Social Work Club. There will be no admission charge for either event.

William Geraway is perhaps the most unique lecturer in America today. He is the only man with a price on his head, or who has been faced with the electric chair, lecturing in the United States. Even more strange is the fact that he speaks for the death penalty, although twice exposed to it himself.

Geraway, 38, having spent half his life in prisons in a 12-state area, twice faced the electric chair on first degree murder charges. He is a man with a purpose, and a past he wants to share with the future leaders of the nation.

Says Geraway, "I have been involved in homicidal situations from Florida to California to Massachusetts—and I know that in certain narrow areas of criminal conduct there is no other answer excepting the death penalty. Prison programming on an adult level is a waste of time and energy—the older offenders are too entrenched in a criminal

lifestyle, they do not WANT to be re-deemed, and all rehabilitative processing must begin and end with the offender himself... the money should be channeled

into juvenile programming and facilities."

Mr. Geraway is accompanied by Stacy Keach's award-winning short film on prisons—"The Repeater."

Mr. Geraway also speaks effectively on the Mafia and the influence of organized crime on the American economy and political structure.

As an appetizer for Mr. Geraway's lecture there will be a free film in Belk Auditorium on Tuesday evening, November 11th at 8:00 p.m. I have previewed the film; it is really great. The title is "Sing Sing Thanksgiving". It is a rock concert in Sing Sing Prison, New York. The groups or individuals that perform are Jimmy Walker, Joan Baez, B.B. King, The East Harlem Singers. It is in color and runs about one hour and a half. Don't miss it or Geraway's lecture one week later.
