Dr. Cratis Williams, chancellor of Appalachian State University, started the Applachian Artists Series with a lecture and personal comments on "Teaching in Appalachia." He very strongly believes that the Appalachian sub - culture is a challenge to teachers who should be a member of that sub-culture of have an understanding and positive attitude toward it.
Whether its teaching or just getting along with people, we all need to look at other cultures and sub - cultures more positively. Just because other people are different does not mean they are inferior:
Dr. Williams read an article where the United States is compared to a fruitcake. This is an interesting analogy that contradicts the "melting pot" euphemism. The United States is more like a fruitcake than a melting pot; each ingredient retains its peculiar characteristics while enhancing the total

Educators are beginning to take steps toward cultural pluralism. Bilingual/bicultural Curricula are being developed in many communities. This awareness of the needs of children who are cultura-ly different is one way of attacking a long-neglected problem.
Members of a subculture often have a low self-concept of themselves and their culture because they are taught to equate the Anglo - American culture with virtue, goodness, and even political purity. Anglo values conflict with many of the subculture's values. The children's selfconcept grows more negative the longer they remain in school.

They belong to two worlds and yet to neither because to be educated they have to reject their own culture and conform. We need to begin understanding other cultures and subcultures around us. Insight into their nature requires us to accept them and their values. What right do we have to judge cultures diversity as "right" or "wrong"?
