

Have You Seen The Lights?

The Mineral Lights Make an Appearance - A Report By D.K. Hackett July 27, 1978 - The 'patient' persistence paid off. Saturday made the whole trip worthwhile. The lights didn't appear until about 10:30 PM. Four frustrated observers waiting cameras and field glasses poised and ready. There was a two minute display and then nothing. At 10:38 the lights returned and danced and blanketed the mountain until 11:11. Through field glasses little blue-white lights could be seen to be moving single file in a straight line. Twelve or more could be seen at a time, with hundreds passing in view. Calculations indicate a speed of 40-50 MPH. The effect called to mind a racing parade of motorcycles whose headlights lit up the canopy of trees for several acres around. Despite the comparison/analogies used, they differed from any lights I have observed. The lights seem to be some kind of a natural phenomenon.

The Mineral Lights of Brown Mountain in Western N.C. are an intriguing occurrence which can neither be explained nor discounted. Whatever their nature may be, they treat hundreds of observers to a "fireworks" display yearly. Their mystery remains yet unsolved. The 'oldtimers' of the region laugh at those who try to explain the lights. From their descriptions, and that of Hackett's, the lights appear as erratic moving balls of light with some angular dimension. They can be any color. They tend to move up and down the rocky outcrops of the mountain, and are often seen at fairly close range.

The ORION Organization is a group of scientists and lay persons interested in the investigation into the nature of the Brown Mountain lights. To date they have identified a number of phenomena, often confused with the Brown Mountain Lights. However, they have not seen one or more of the true Brown Mountain Lights. In order to plan an expedition to observe these rare lights, they are collecting as many eye witness accounts as possible. They wish to enlist your help in finding people who have seen the lights.

Confirmation of the existence of the mineral lights and explanations of what they are may remain a mystery for some time to come. Several Mars Hill students have seen the lights. Two university of Toronto psychologists report that persons who quickly fall head-over heels in love are apt to be people who believe that the fates, the stars or cosmic forces guide their lives.

On the other hand, say psychologists Kenneth and Karen Dion, people who are highly rational or pragmatic almost never fall in love at first sight.

The Dions, writing in the *Journal of Clinical Psychology* say they have also discovered a difference between the way men and women deal with their emotions when they are in love.

Women, they report, are more likely to be elated and euphoric when in love; men, on the other hand, often find love disruptive and uncomfortable and commonly loose sleep over it.

A STUDY SUGGESTS WORKING STUDENTS ARE SMARTER

Maybe if you want to get better grades, you should get a job making hamburgers at Batam Chef. In any case, start working. A recent study found that students working part-time jobs under work-study programs get better grades than their non-working peers.

The study, conducted by the University of Texas - Austin's Financial Aid Office, indicated that both undergraduate and graduate working students averaged anywhere from .06 to .11 grade points higher than non-working students on financial aid, and than the general student body. UT's study results, moreover, were about the same as other such studies conducted nationwide, added Ben Stough, associate director of financial aid at UT.

Stough speculated that the higher GPAs might have something to do with workstudy students laboring as research or lab assistants in their field of study, thus giving them more experience and knowledge in those fields.
