

Hill College's Department of on and Philosophy will sponsor an excursion to Israel and Greece 17. The trip will be led by Dr. as Sawyer, professor of New Teshan Greek, and Dr. Page Lee, ment professor.

Roup will depart New York's International Airport and arrive in the following day. In Greece will visit the Acropolis, the Mars Hill, where Paul preached will be visited and there will be an Assina, Hydra, and Poros.

of the Bible. Included are The Olives, Gesthesemane, the Nativity which is reputed

to be built over the site of Christ's birth, the new city of Jerusalem, Calvary, the Garden Tomb, old Jerusalem, and the Dome of the Rock. The tour will also visit Jordan to tour Jericho, the oldest known inhabited city in the world, Oumran, where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found, and Lazarus' tomb among other sites. The group will go to Masada, the site of the last stand of the Judean revolt against Rome. The remains of storehouses, cisterns, and a 6th Century Byzantine church still stand. The tour will return to New York on the 11th day.

Cost for the tour is \$1728, and includes all transportation, hotels, meals, scheduled sightseeing, and tips. The trip is open to the general public, and a \$100 deposit made by March 15 will confirm a reservation on the tour. Additional information is available from Dr. Lee or Dr. Sawyer.
