Israel and Greece

Trip Planned To Israel And Greece

Mars Hill College's Department of
Religion and Philosophy will sponsor an
eight-day excursion to Israel and Greece
from March 7-17. The trip will be led by Dr.
Thomas Sawyer, professor of New Tes-
tament and Greek, and Dr. Page Lee,
chairman of the department and Old
Testament professor.

The group will depart New York's
John F. Kennedy International Airport and arrive in
Athens on the following day. In Greece
the group will visit the Acropolis, the
Parthenon, the Agora of ancient Ath-
ens, and Mars Hill, where Paul preached
and the philosophers of Athens. Old Cor-
inth will be visited and there will be an
optional tour offered to visit the islands
of Aegina, Hydra, and Poros.

The group will arrive in Tel Aviv on
the fourth day to explore the famous
sites of the Bible. Included are The
Mount of Olives, Gesthesemane, the
Church of the Nativity which is reputed

Mars Hill campus."

Current vice-president of SGA
Aubrey Peterson was asked what's not
being done in SGA that he'd like to do,
and he replied, "I don't want to tear
down the SGA too much because I am a
part of it now and I would like to think
that during the course of the year serving
as vice president that I made at least a

nor total conservatism. If something's
being done wrong, he'll do all he can to
change it. But if its been done right, he'll
"fight the change to the end."
