### Service Available to Students Entering Law School:

A major new service for students who are thinking ahead to decisions about graduate and professional degrees has been announced by the Law School Admission Council. The Law School Admission Services, supported by the organizations that administer the Law School Admission Test (LSAT), the new service is called The Law Package.

The four-part program of publications, tapes and self-evaluation materials, The Law Package will help students expand and evaluate their interest in law. Students can take a "tryout" LSAT, and request that the Law School Admission Services score it for their eyes. They can use the results to evaluate their strong points and weak points.

The Law Package will also help students explore questions about the admission process and law school, the aims of education, and the range of careers available with a law degree. To assist students who decide to apply to law school, The Law Package provides a guide to the admission process.

Available from the Law School Admission Services for just ten dollars, The Law Package includes: YOU, THE FUTURE AND LAW SCHOOL, a book that describes legal career options and what to expect in law school; THE TRYOUT LSAT that students can take and return to LSAT for a confidential analysis of their test results; INFORMATION OF FIVE LAW SCHOOLS that students designate on The Law Package data form; THE ADMISSION PROCESS: A GUIDE, a booklet that lists major factors that law schools consider in reviewing applicants; financial information; and additional

sources of information relative to legal education and the admission process.

### Rotary Foundation Awards 341 International Scholarships in U.S.:

Three hundred forty-one U.S. students are among the nearly 900 from 65 countries awarded 1984-85 Rotary Foundation Scholarships for study abroad. The recipients were selected because of their outstanding ambassadorial potential as well as scholarship ability.

In 1984-85, the Rotary Foundation will spend more than \$9.9 million for the scholarships which underwrite the cost of study abroad, including travel to and from the study country, academic fees, and room and board.

All Rotary Foundation Scholars study in countries other than their own. They are expected to share their culture and broaden their understanding of others in an active program of people-to-people diplomacy.

Rotary Foundation Scholarships are for graduate, undergraduate, vocational, and journalism students, and teachers of the handicapped. Men and women interested in applying for a 1985-86 Rotary Foundation Scholarship should contact their local Rotary club. The deadline for applications is March 1, 1984.

### Milk Crate Recovery Project:

The North Carolina Dairy Products Association has implemented a large-scale program to recover some of the thousands of milk delivery cases which have been lost by the state's dairy industry, and to discourage future misuse of these cases.

In announcing the program, Association President Joe C. McMillan of Wilkesboro noted that over one million dollars is lost each year, just in North Carolina, from the unauthorized use of the plastic and metal wire type containers.

"All milk cases are the private, legally registered property of dairies and misappropriation is a misdemeanor under

North Carolina law," McMillan said. "This million dollar loss is borne by the North Carolina dairy industry and ultimately by the general public."

"The misused cases can be found utilized in hundreds of creative ways, limited only by the imagination of the individual," McMillan continued. "They are used as storage containers, tool boxes, shelving dividers, beds for pets, bicycle and motorcycle trunks, album racks, dormitory furniture, etc. There is an attitude by many that these cases are free for the taking; nothing could be further from the truth."

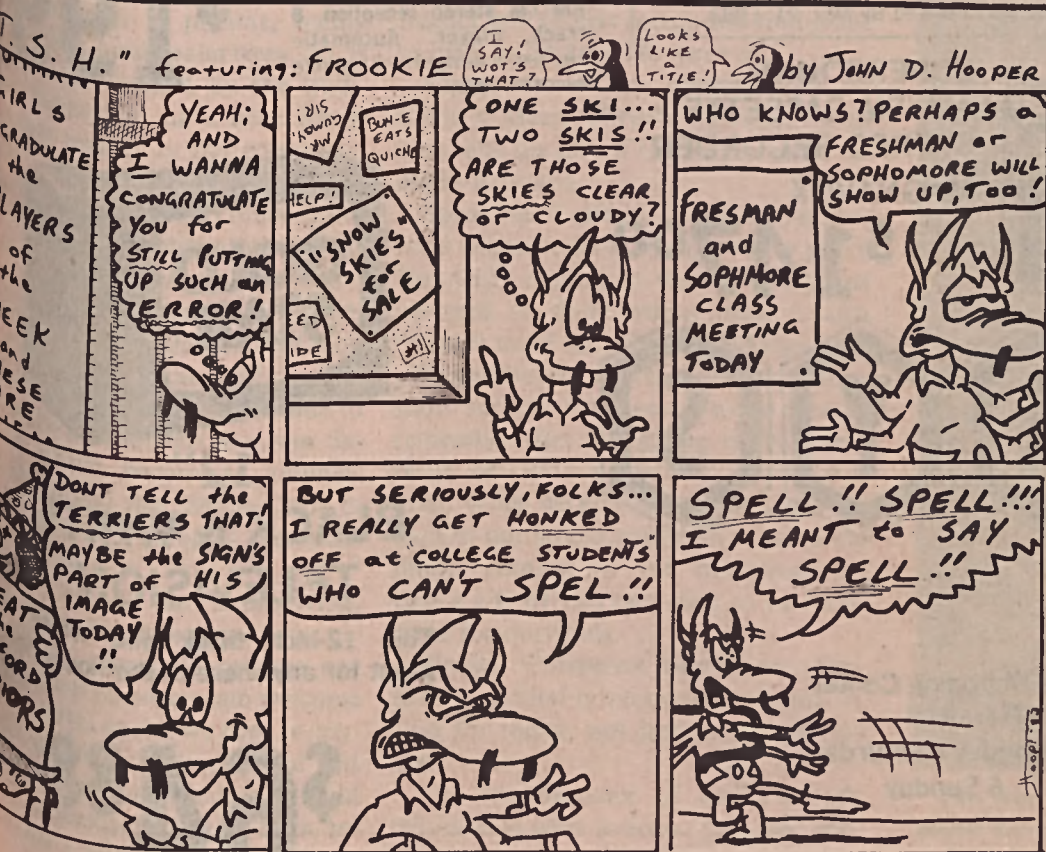
Any cases to be returned at this time can be done so by placing a call to the nearest dairy and giving information as to where and when they might be picked up.
