A gift of \$36,480 of R. J. Reynolds stock has been given to Mars Hill College by Mrs. Mae Cline Stroup of Shelby. A long-time benefactor of the college, Mrs. Stroup has designated that her gift go to the school's Campaign for the Future.

Mrs. Stroup's family has had a long relationship with Mars Hill. A women's residence hall, named for the family, was dedicated in 1941. She has been a member of several of the school's boards, including the trustees and advisors. She attended Greensboro College and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

She has also served on the Boards of Trustees of Wake Forest University and Gardner-Webb College. A member of the First Baptist Church of Shelby, she has held numerous offices there and has served on the Education Commission of the NC State Baptist Convention. She is also active in civic affairs, having been chairman of the Red Cross chapter, president of the Women's Club, a member of the Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society, and a member of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mars Hill's Campaign for the Future is a five year, \$10 million capital improvement effort. After the completion of the chapel, construction of a new cafeteria and the renovation and/or conversion of several existing buildings on campus will commence. The plan will also fund such items as new equipment and scholarships.
