Dr. A. Max Lennon, president of Clemson University and a Mars Hill College alumnus, will give the baccalaureate address during commencement activities next Sunday.

Lennon, a native of Evergreen in the eastern part of the state, is well acquainted with MHC. All eight children of his family attended Mars Hill, as did his mother and his wife.

A nationally recognized expert in agriculture, he earned his bachelor's degree and doctorate from NC State University. He began his career teaching at Texas Tech University, was selected as the dean of the school of agriculture at the University of Missouri, and was vice-president for agricultural administration at Ohio State University when the Clemson University trustees selected him as president in 1985.
