## The Ribbon Is Cut! Dining Hall Becomes Official

After 8 years of planning and work, Ganelle Pittman cut the ribbon and unveiled a plaque, dedicating Mars Hill College's new Pittman Dining Hall, Sat., Dec. 4.

The ceremony began with the concert band entertaining over 150 guests with their selections of Christmas music. Dr. Fred Bentley, president for the college, continued the welcome with recognition of important guests, including James and Ganelle Pittman, for whom the dining hall is named; their children; the Board of Trustees and Advisors; and various workmen for the project. The College Choir performed a variety of Christmas songs.

**Expressions** appreciation followed, given by various officials of the school, boards of trustees and advisors, and student government.

Andy Thompson, president of the Student Government Association, extended his thanks to all involved with the project, especially the Pittman's, and reflected on the beginning of the building experience from the student's point of view. "I remember coming down Men's hill and looking to my right where there were two posts and a sign hung between. That sign read, 'If you build it, they will come,' and here we

are today," Thompson said.
Dr. James Lenburg represented the faculty, talking about what people encounter in a dining hall, "more advising than what goes on in the professors' offices," and expressed thanks for the "nourishment of institution."

Dr. Earl Leininger said the building was "tangible evidence of the concern for the total well-being of our during students," appreciation comments.

The proclamation of the naming of the dining hall was given by Ed Beach, chairman of the board of trustees. The decree described James A. Pittman as having "ultimate devotion and loyalty," he is a "true steward," and one of "chief Hill's Mars ambassadors." Mrs. Pittman was described as being "totally supportive of her husband, Mars Hill College, her church, and community."

An emotional James Pittman responded to the decree with a thank-you to all who helped make the dream a reality. He said he hopes that the dining hall will not only be a place for physical food, but

Guard Glen Hayes put down 7 points and 4 rebounds during the second half, and redshirt freshman guard James Barber also put in 5 points. Starting center Cedric Mansell pumped in 13 points highlighted by two spectacular slam dunks, and also chipped in 6 rebounds. (Mansell had 2 blocks.) Starting forward Stanley Wheless was perfect

from the free throw line, making 4 of 4, all during the first half.

The real story of the game was found in Mars Hill's tenacious defense which allowed only 22 of 58 shot

attempts to reach the bottom of the net - that is only 38% shooting. For the game, MHC shot 34 of 64, which is 53%. Mars Hill also hit 22 of 29 free throw attempts (76%), 12 were hit (out of 12) in the first half.
