Lemon Cookies.

1/3 cup butter 1 lemon, juice and 1 cup sugar grated rind. 1 tsp lemon ex-1/2 cup milk tract. 2 cups self-rising flour

Directions: Cream the butter and sugar together. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time. Beat until thoroughly blended. Add flour and milk alternately. Then add the lemon juice, rind and extract. Drop by teaspoonful on a greased baking sheet and bake in a
