

The major tobacco product of North Carolina is cigarettes. Available statisties indicate that there is one tobacco center in North Carolina which makes more cigarettes than any other city in the world. The growth of this phase of the industry has been little sort of phenomenal.

Viewing the industry from a national angle it represents quite a fac tor in the internal revenue receipt of the United States Government During th elast fiscal year the Government collected in North Carolina \$225,315,303.53, which represents more than five per cent of the entire nation's internal revenue from all sources. More than \$6,000,000 per annum, is custom charges, are paid by the tobacco industry on goods and ommodities shipped into North Caroina from foreign countries.




